Inspirational corner: A tribute to Hans Rosling

On 7th Feb 2017, humanity lost one of its most prominent figures of global public health and sustainable development with the death of Professor Hans Rosling.

Professor of international health at the Karolinska Institute, an outstanding statistician, in whose hands the data sings, a global health specialist and activist for a healthier and less unequal world.

From Mozambique, where he worked as a public-health advisor and also the only doctor for 300,000 inhabitants, to Cuba where he used data and facts to candidly convince the government officials to end a deleterious protein rationing policy. Professor Rosling saved no effort in helping to improve health care for the poorest and fully neglected. Big data was always his favourite companion through his endeavour for a healthier world, and according to him; data always pointed at one particular culprit in tragic health crises:

"Extreme poverty produces diseases. Evil forces hide there."

It is also worth mentioning that Hans Rosling was one of TED heroes, he used the platform to communicate his message to an international audience. His first TED talk in 2006 made the world better aware of him and his quests, and since then he delivered 10 very exciting and perspective-changing TED talks. It hasn't been an easy choice, and I would definitely recommend all of Hans Rosling's TED talks. Nevertheless, a choice had to be made. So I went for an issue that is -in my humble opinion at least- a matter of great concern and alarm. In the following TED-talk (2010, Cannes) Hans Rosling uses his captivating data presentation skills to address one of the most troubling issues of our time; the population crisis. And as usual for him, the data paves a way to de-escalating population growth and bringing the world population to a desired and sustainable homeostasis.
